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These 50 Notable Women Executives Over 50 have jumped hurdles to reach the highest levels of business, medicine, higher education and nonprofits. A number defied the odds in rising to influential positions in male-dominated fields such as banking and financial services, law and manufacturing.

Women, of course, still face formidable obstacles. They represent only 11 percent of top earners at S&P 500 companies, according to a January study by Catalyst. And they make up just over a quarter of executive and senior-level officials and managers. But they see the big picture and are bringing their sisters along by leading diversity and inclusion efforts, supporting women's resource groups, pushing for more family-friendly policies and mentoring younger colleagues. That should provide encouragement to already influential millennial women who have the opportunity to dramatically reshape the workplace in the years ahead.
